CITE Training Course: Intersection Capacity Analysis | June 14, 2016

Location: Room 201, Rogers Communication Centre, 80 Gould Street, Toronto

The Canadian Institute of Transportation Engineers and ITE Toronto Section invite you to attend a one day training session on the Theory of Signalized Intersections and hands-on problem solving. This will be a day of practical training in traffic engineering basics, enabling you to become an informed practitioner. The Canadian Capacity Guide for Signalized Intersections (CCGSI) and the Intercalc software will be used in this training. Participants will use the software and review comparisons to output from the Synchro software, to develop a greater understanding of intersection capacity methods and how these relate to Synchro.

TAC Corner: Strategic Opportunities for Integrating Health and Transportation

Over the past several decades, we have removed physical activity from our daily lives by designing car oriented communities. Long commutes and time spent inactive has adversely impacted our health. From the 2014 Medical Officer's Health GTHA report:

- The annual cost of inactivity and obesity in the GTHA is approximately \$4 billion per year. This includes \$1.4 billion in direct medical costs.
- Diabetes rates in the GTHA are projected to double in 25 years, from 7.1% in 2002 to 16.4% by 2027.
- Diabetes related medical costs attributable to inactivity currently exceed \$550 million in GTHA each year.
- There are 12,500 new cases of diabetes registered every year in GTHA.
- Road traffic collisions remain the leading cause of unintentional injury and fatalities. In 2013 alone, there were 1741 fatalities and 120,660 personal injuries in Canada as per Canadian Motor Vehicle Collision Traffic Statistics.

The above challenges are huge and transportation professionals can play a significant role by improving the planning and design of transportation infrastructure. Health status can be improved when transportation systems facilitate public and active transportation, whereby people could safely incorporate physical activity into their daily lives. Other outcomes such as reducing greenhouse gas emissions and congestion could also be improved for higher productivity and sustainability.

The Transportation Association of Canada (TAC) is undertaking a strategic opportunities study for integrating health and transportation. The objective of this study is to undertake a comprehensive review of existing tools, policies, guidelines and practices to identify opportunities to further strengthen the understanding and application of health considerations into transportation planning, design and decision making.

CITE is working closely with TAC to deliver to launch this study. Your input and support for the study will help to move forward this project.
